C **Amen. Come, Lord Jesus.**

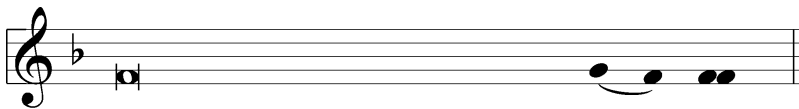

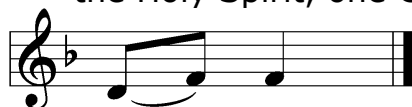

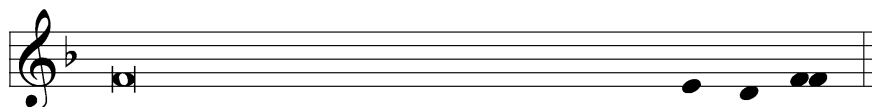
